



Creating a First-Year Resume.

You're in your first year of college. Do you need a resume? Absolutely. A first-year resume can be used to apply for on-campus employment, scholarships, or a research position.

Highlight your current education.

Your major, the degree you're pursuing, and current coursework all paint a picture of you, your interests and planned career path—even if you're unsure of that path!

Give examples.

Show, don't just tell. Craft bulleted accomplishment summaries under each entry that give the reader a sense of how you used the skills you developed.

Focus on skills.

In describing your experience, go beyond paid employment and include other experiences, including camps, volunteering and other activities, as well as knowledge of software like Microsoft Office or other tech credentials.

Mind the length.

Limit your first-year resume to one page.

Highlight transferable skills.

Transferable skills are skills you've developed in every position or activity. These include leadership, project management, teamwork and others you believe will be relevant to a resume reader.

I have a resume from high school. Can I just use that?

In a word, no. Your high school resume is a good place to start, but you'll want to tailor the approach to make it more effective for a college student. In your first year of college, it's fine to include experience from your high school years. As you progress in college, you'll phase these out in favor of other, more recent and relevant experience.

Brainstorm experiences, skills developed/demonstrated and accomplishments:

What was the biggest class project you worked on in high school—or during your first year of college and what was your role?

What was your biggest passion in high school and how did you spend your down time?

Did you volunteer or participate in extracurriculars during high school? Describe your experience.

What student organizations are you active in and what kinds of projects are you a part of?

Use this formula to create an accomplishment statement:

choose an action verb + **give an example** + **state the outcome**
(what you did) *(how you did it)* *(the impact you had)*
